United Way of Greater Stark County believes that we must disrupt the vicious cycle of disinvestment and displacement which damage the vitality of communities of families with low or even no income.


Every dollar invested in high-quality early care and education can yield up to \$12 in better outcomes in health, public safety, economic productivity, and education.

Pilot Program

Through a pilot program, United Way of Greater Stark County worked with local organizations to provide services to the students and families at **Gibbs Elementary School,** located near the Shorb Neighborhood.

Services provided:

Positive Parenting Program (PPP) SPARK Kindergarten Readiness Program Assistance with rent and transportation Weekend Backpack Food Program Community Health Worker on site

In the **Shorb Neighborhood**, Canton4AllPeople and United Way collaborated to provide:

A community organizer
Ring Doorbells for families in the neighborhood
Leadership Training
Home repairs and home down payment assistance
Neighborhood events

Well-defined projects and activities toward a comprehensive child poverty reduction plan for Stark County with specific neighborhood-level approaches is what is necessary to help the families in our community.

People who live in quality neighborhoods have access to safe housing, recreation, good schools, and low crime, and are often surrounded by supportive neighborhoods.

Growing up poor is linked to a host of negative economic, health and social conditions. Studies show that children who experience poverty have more behavioral and social problems, more health issues, and lower academic achievement.

One myth we must overcome is the widespread belief that if people are poor, it is because of bad decisions or laziness. The data shows the opposite. **No one chooses to be poor.**

Focusing on programs that address basic needs and help alleviate the effects of poverty is what is needed.
